GETTING A COVID-19 VACCINE:

A SOCIAL STORY FOR PEOPLE WITH INTELLECTUAL AND DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES



COVID-19 is a disease caused by a virus that spreads easily and can make people very sick. The COVID-19 vaccine is a medicine that prevents you from getting COVID-19. Like most vaccines, the COVID-19 vaccine is given by shots using a needle. This social story can help you understand why it's important to get a COVID-19 vaccine and what you can expect.




I want to protect myself and people around me from getting sick from COVID-19.



I will get a COVID-19 vaccine so I don't get very sick from COVID-19.



I can get a COVID-19
vaccine at a
pharmacy, urgent care
clinic, hospital, or
other site where it is
given near me.




I will bring my health insurance card.
Someone who supports me may hold on to it for me.



If I have a guardian,
I will bring written
permission or required
consent form that says
I have their agreement
to get the vaccine.



The shot goes in my arm with a needle.



I will roll up my sleeve or take off my jacket when it is my turn.



I will need to relax and sit still.



I can look away from my arm and close my eyes if I am afraid.



I can also listen to music or talk to someone who supports me if I am scared.



The person giving the shot will wipe my skin clean first.




I may feel a pinch when the needle goes into my arm.



They will cover it with a band-aid, or tape and a cotton ball.



My arm may be sore after the shot and I might feel tired, have a fever, chills, or headache.



There are different versions of the vaccine. Most require 2 shots. I will get information about which vaccine I received.



I will make an appointment to get my second shot.



The vaccine will start to protect me from COVID-19 about a week or 2 after I get the second shot.



I will continue to stay safe by wearing a mask, staying at least 6 feet away from others, and practicing healthy habits like handwashing and using hand sanitizer.



I want to keep myself and others healthy and safe from COVID-19.



I want to keep everyone healthy and safe from COVID-19.
